There is not a great deal of time to be reflective or to ponder on the less enjoyable parts of the job simply because, amongst other things, the children won't let me and I love this. I urge you to look at the additional pages to this newsletter and see the pictures of work completed by our Year 6 class who are studying aspects of the first World War. The standard of work is, in my opinion very high for this age group but the fact that this homework and not the product of guided tasks in school, really highlights the children's enthusiasm for their learning and commitment to their class teacher and, dare I say it, their school. Some of the children dedicated several hours of their free time to producing their 'master pieces' and, I hope you will agree, they should be very proud of themselves.

In normal times, we attempt to enhance the curriculum by ensuring that the children have an opportunity to go on school trips and outings to places of interest that support the topic of study. I am hopeful that Year 6 will still be able to visit Bletchley Park to discover where the code breakers worked and to learn in particular about Alan Turing and the Enigma machine. This is

because Bletchley have a strong risk assessment in place and are doing everything they can to accommodate the children in a safe environment. Sadly, not everywhere can give such guarantees and I am not optimistic about the trip to Normandy going ahead this year unless we see a significant change in the pandemic situation.

The impact on the children in all year groups is significant as every class has, in the past, enjoyed outings in one form or another. I can only hope that the void left can be filled with good teaching and the use of available media to make the classroom experience as enjoyable as possible.

The highlight of today was lunchtime. No, I did not indulge in three courses and a bottle of red! Instead I had the pleasure of listening to Sienna Jones (Class 1) read her book to me and I have to say, I was bowled over. I have always thought that my greatest pleasure as a teacher was helping children learn to read and witnessing their delight as the squiggles on a page gradually became familiar and decipherable text. Miss Vukomanovic must be delighted with her work as must Sienna's parents who are clearly working in partnership with her. Sienna read to me about Harry Smith and his horse, who unfortunately ate too many rotten apples and, after galloping drunkenly through the streets, ended up in a public car park with a severe hangover and sound asleep (remember those nights?). She used such great expression and was so enthusiastic that I insisted she read the whole book to me which she was quite happy to do as long as we could discuss it afterwards. If we carry on like this, I imagine Sienna will be starting a book club!

So, I finish the week a little bruised but happy in the knowledge that we are still attending to our core purpose, providing a good education for children. I have great confidence in the team here and, although parent evenings may not be as convivial next week due to covid-19 restrictions, I hope that they are useful. We are going against the grain in having them at all.




