These are strange days in the world of school leadership and I am beginning to question my sanity and my innings! In times past, I may have sought solace in the classroom listening to the children whose conversations fascinate me or perhaps immersed myself in some DIY around the school but the broken leg is both frustrating and restraining. I run a tight ship with a robust policy on attendance and I am not about to apologise for this to anyone because it makes a difference.

I have spent some time this weekend looking at the most recent parent questionnaire or 'satisfaction survey' as it may be better named. In reality, the survey is a duplicate of the Ofsted, Parent View used during inspection. I have crunched the numbers and produced the results as percentages below. One respondent has a value of approximately 1.4% and I have rounded it to 1.5% so it is fairly easy to see what the numbers represent.

10. The school lets me know how my child is doing. 97% agree 3% disagree 11. There is a good range of subjects available to my child at this school. 100% agree

12. My child can take part in clubs and activities at this school. 97% agree 3% disagree

13. The school supports my child's wider personal development. 100% agree

14. I would recommend this school to another parent. (yes or no) 100% agree

Included in the survey was the opportunity to make comments and I am very grateful to everyone that did as most were complimentary and will certainly boost morale amongst the great teachers we are fortunate to have. I sometimes remind them that, unlike some professions, the results of their work and its impact on individuals may not be recognised until many years in the future and that's why sometimes teaching can appear to be a 'thankless task'.

The comments have also provided me with some useful information and I have been looking at how we can act on some suggestions. One thing that is clear is the need for more co-curricular clubs (term brazenly plagiarised from Mr Wallace last year) for children in KS1 and these to be of a non-sporting nature. The problem with clubs is that they need to be staffed and, as most will know, I tend to oversee a lot myself. The teachers work very hard and their time is limited, particularly if they have families of their own to look after so, I believe that if they are willing to run a co-curricular club after school hours they should be compensated for it. I have spoken to the staff about this and delighted to be able to announce that, after Easter we should be launching a

computer club run by Miss Allen, an embroidery club run by Miss Southgate and possibly a cookery club run by Mrs Vickers. Details are yet to be confirmed as we have to work out the timetable and there will need to be a charge for the clubs but, the wheels are in motion.

I hope that I clarified the position about packed lunches in my Parentmail last week. I caught a snippet of a Saturday morning news show yesterday with a truly 'inspirational' school cook being interviewed having won School Cook of the Year and it reminded me of being in schools that provided hot meals. I would love to think that this could one day be possible but, in truth, it is highly unlikely without a huge investment in new facilities.

I shall look through the comments again and update everyone if I feel we can make any alterations. I would be foolish to deny that the results of the survey are not good and it is clear that the majority are happy.

With very little time to prepare due to the half -term break, we competed in the Year 3/4 tennis competition last week. The four children representing the school, worked hard in the time we did have and put in a great performance at the event. They won their group games and then won their semi-final matches to win a place in the final against Long Crendon. Unfortunately, the Crendon team were too strong on the night and we lost some very close games finishing in second place. Congratulations to Long Crendon and we look forward to the next event.

At the beginning of last week, we had a visit from Rabbi Zvi, who came and spoke to the children about the customs and traditions of the Jewish faith. It is really important that we give children the opportunity to understand the beliefs of others and what it means to be Jewish in the United Kingdom. Ignorance and misunderstanding can often lead to fear and discord so we will continue to try and educate the children about the diversity of religions and cultural difference as best we can.

This morning, I am very grateful to the Boardman and Snell families who came into school and pruned the trees at the side of the field in preparation for the new fencing to be erected. Mrs Snell (Snail to Class 1) managed to engage the whole clan into helping including her father, an incredibly knowledgeable man about all things to do with nature. I have had to give in to the dream of being able to finish the fence myself and hopefully it will be completed in the coming week.
