The annual school report for each child should go home today and, although most of you know, it is worth me informing parents why we send them out now and not at the very end of the year as most schools do. The reports take time to write (forgive my atrocious handwriting please) and, in my opinion, anything that teachers do, should have a positive impact for the children. Therefore, rather than be a historic recount of the year, we summarise the year to date and include targets to be worked on for the final term. In this way, we avoid a situation where a report may not be favourable and parents explain that, had they been informed, they could have done something to address an issue.

The children will have their targets personalised and given to them in the classroom. They will also be explained and discussed personally so that they know what they need to focus on and how they can improve. If parents can also support the children when possible, this has a really significant impact on progress and eventual attainment. It is not about doing loads of extra work but rather about taking some time to reinforce or consolidate things.
