Homework Policy

April 2024

Rationale

This policy is based on the belief that a well-managed homework programme helps children to develop the skills and attitudes they will need for successful lifelong learning. Homework supports the development of independent learning skills and provides parents (**please note that the word “parents” is inclusive of carers and guardians of children**) with an opportunity to take part in their children's education. Learning at home is an essential part of good education. Regular homework is important as it gives pupils the opportunity to practise at home the tasks covered in class, and helps the pupils work towards improving important skills. It also helps children and young people to become confident and independent in their learning, which will help throughout their time at school and in to adult life.

We consistently review our policy so that our homework is as manageable and effective as possible. We request that parents support the policy and ensure that children complete what is expected of them.

Amount of Homework

The amount of compulsory homework each child receives varies according to their Key Stage and their Year group. Children and parents are welcome to supplement the statutory homework should they wish through use of activities they choose themselves or family visits to places of interest etc but these must not be instead of or in place of school homework. The school also provides advice on helping children at home.

We expect all children to read for a short time (10 – 15 minutes) on every week day and this must be recorded in their Reading Record Book. However, whilst we insist on these five days, it is evident that some children will read more than this and this is to be encouraged, as regular reading has a huge impact on the children's progress in Literacy.

Spellings

The children receive spellings to learn at home and are expected to spend some time each day carrying out a 'look, say, cover, write, check' procedure in order to help learn the words they are given. Problems occur when children try to learn them on only one attempt when we know that, spending a short amount of time each day revising and learning spellings has proved to be the best way to build up a deeper understanding and range of vocabulary. The message is, 'little and often'. We do not have a 'weekly spelling test' but teachers use a range of assessment tasks throughout the week to check that children are learning to spell correctly. In the Early Years and, if necessary, in Year 1, children are

given flashcards or a spelling ring to practise their spellings at home. These begin to be sent home once a child has learned their initial individual phonic sounds.

Handwriting

The children in the Early Years are expected to complete 5 minutes of handwriting practice each day, as well as their reading. Children in other year groups may be given handwriting as an additional homework if it is an area that needs specific development or improvement. The school will provide the handwriting materials and the correct pen to use. Children must not complete any homework using biro.

Numeracy

All children in Years 1-6 receive some Numeracy homework during the week. For KS2 children (Years 3-6) this varies between an on-line task using a computer programme called MyMaths and a workbook specific for a particular age range. The school PTA cover the cost of the annual MyMaths subscription and each child is given access to it from home. In KS1 (Years 1 and 2) the children also have a specific workbook from which pages are selected each week.

Numeracy homework is handed out on Thursdays and expected to be handed in on the following Wednesday. It is often designed so that the children can complete a part of it on separate days rather than in one whole session.

Written Homework

The children in Years 3 – 5 alternate between a Learning Log task and a Reading Comprehension. The Learning Log tasks are designed so that the children can interpret them in a personal way and use a variety of mediums to complete them. Children in Year 6 alternate between a SPAG (Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar) homework, Reading Comprehension and occasionally a Learning Log.

Assessment of Homework

As per the agreed Home School Contract, parents must sign their child's Reading Record book each day. This book is an important assessment document and Class teachers check them every day to verify that they have been signed by parents. The class teacher will also include written comments in the Reading Record and points for individual children to consider when reading at home. Parents should refrain from writing notes in the Reading Records and instead, just sign and date them.

Learning Logs are marked using post it notes to record teachers' comments and a selection may be marked by the Headteacher each week. Reading Comprehension and Numeracy tasks are marked by/with the class teacher, as is the SPAG.

The Role of Parents

Parents must recognise that homework is not optional and must be completed. Ideally, we hope that parents help children to manage their time and support them in organising their homework throughout the course of a week. If there are issues with homework then parents should contact the class teacher.

Parents are requested to support their child in his/her homework and where possible promote opportunities for home learning in accordance with the Home School Agreement.

Parents must sign the Reading Record book to affirm that the child has completed the reading homework.

Parents must support children in presenting any homework carefully and in line with the high expectations of the school.

Additional Homework

There are times when it is necessary to give children additional homework and it is expected to be completed. Such additions include:

- Learning a script for a production or assembly
- Learning a poem
- Finding something for a class discussion
- Recording the weather for the week
- Recording a diary of events over a week such as food/TV programmes/exercise
- Watching a media event
- Watching a TV programme on a particular day
- Learning Times Tables
- Keeping up with news events
- Learning French Vocabulary
- Handwriting Practice

Holidays

It is not school policy to give homework during holiday periods but we encourage all children to continue with their reading and to take an interest in the world around them.

There are times during Year 6 that the class teacher will set homework if it is deemed necessary for examination preparation or such events as musical performances and stage productions.

Equal Opportunities

We recognise children as individuals and endeavour to ensure that they all reach their full potential. When setting homework, teachers should consider the different learning needs of children and those on the SEN register may be given differentiated homework according to their needs. Teachers also consider children with disabilities and severe learning difficulties and ensure that homework is matched to the child's Learning Support Plan (LSP).

Teachers take care to avoid homework that may reinforce discrimination by gender, religion, race, ethnicity or socio-economic status and any tasks that may reinforce stereotypes.
